

DESIRE LESSON THREE: EVIDENCE

There was a popular children's show that was televised very early on Sunday mornings. It was a clay-animated series that ran from February, 1961- December, 2004. The plot centered around its main character, Davey, who wrestled with a moral conflict in each episode and as a result, its young viewers learned valuable life lessons from Davey's experiences. I loved this television show, and my internal clock made sure I woke up in time to view it each week.

I don't recall how I learned about the Davey and Goliath show, but I remember the excitement I experienced every Sunday morning. I remember asking my parents for permission to leave my bed early to watch the show, and they reminded me that I must be very quiet to take care not to wake up my baby sister. We must have made a sweet sight, two little girls sitting on the floor in our nightgowns meeting with God through the Davey and Goliath television show.

Merriam-Webster defines the word *evidence* as something that furnishes proof.

YOUR TURN: How is the Godship of Jesus evident in the world or in your life? For a moment, place yourself in the sandals of the apostles. Think about the miracles they had witnessed, Jesus' ministry they took part in, the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, the Last Supper, and the horror they witnessed at Jesus' arrest, trial, scourging, His carrying of the cross, His crucifixion, and glorious resurrection. Matthew records in his Gospel that the apostles fled when Jesus was arrested. Think about that for a moment, they fled. John records in his Gospel, that only he and a few women were left present at the cross. He records in John 19:25: *Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene*. Before Jesus' arrest, He disclosed to His apostles that He would rise again on the third day. He also appeared to over 500 people after His resurrection.
